## Access Statement for Elgin Museum 2017

### Introduction

Elgin Museum is Scotland's oldest continuously independent museum and opened in 1843. It tells the story of Moray from before the dinosaurs to the present day, through its displays, school and group visits, events and lectures.

The Museum is at the east end of the High Street in Elgin's town centre which is on the flat.

We are a VisitScotland 4 star visitor attraction.

The displays are housed on two floors although the majority of exhibits and the accessible toilet are on the ground floor. The Category A listed building status has prohibited permission for the installation of a lift. The upstairs displays change annually; photographs and text are available in a file downstairs. The ground floor has sloped access for wheelchair users. Our volunteers are there to make everyone's visit as effective as possible so anyone with particular access or other needs is encouraged to ask. For example we have object handling boxes, and museum guides in foreign languages. If in doubt, please ask before your visit. We look forward to welcoming you. ### Pre-Arrival

- There is a map of where to find us on our website. Please phone for more detailed advice and suggestions of where to park.
- The nearest railway station is Elgin, on the Inverness-Aberdeen line, approx. 1 km away and a 20min. walk. Taxis are usually outside the station. There are taxi ranks at both ends of the High Street.
- The bus station is in the St Giles Centre off the High Street, and approx. 300m away and a 10 min. walk. There is a lift and an escalator from the bus station to High Street level. No. 10 bus stops on the A96 (Alexandra Road) at the back of the Museum – 2 mins walk.
- The surrounding streets are paved and the town centre is pedestrianised, although not traffic free outside the Museum.

- Any printed materials can be photocopied in larger font on request. The web site has a choice of font sizes.

### Car Parking and Arrival

- The Museum has no parking space of its own. There are 14 spaces immediately behind the Museum. Parking is free, but for those without Blue Badges, restricted to one hour. Across the A96, parking is free in the Cooper Park, but restricted to 3 hours. There is pay and display parking 50m from the Museum, accessed via the High Street from the east: 1-2hr £1, 2-4hr £2.

- There is a kerb ramp outside the Museum gate. The final approach to the front door is up a gentle slope with a hand rail on the right hand side. There are no steps. Drop off is possible at the gate.
- When the Museum is open the outer door is open. There is a wheelchair accessible push pad for the inner door (opens outwards) if it is not open, and a door bell. Gallery assistants are just inside the door at the reception desk.
- Door opening width: 920mm, 36.25"

### Main Entrance, Reception and Ticketing Area

- The main entrance and reception are on the ground floor with no steps.
- Seating can be made available in this area.
- The floor surface here is flags.
- Lighting is fluorescent.
- There is no low counter at the reception desk, but it is a simple matter for the gallery assistant to come round. There is no glass barrier.
- Entry is free. Donations are welcome.

- There is a hearing loop system in reception.
- Magnifying glass, pencil and paper available - and a personal tour available on request.

#### Attraction (displays, exhibits, events, etc.)

- Interpretation is mainly in the form of text and illustrations, either as wall panels and individual object labels, or in folders in holders next to the display. The gallery assistants are around and about and there to help you, and expect to be asked.
- We have handling boxes for various topics. Please contact us to arrange your visit so we can make sure there is a suitable volunteer or member of staff available. Alternatively, please ask if you would like one of our volunteers to come to your group.
- There is no background music or flashing lights. It can be noisy if there is a school group or family activity in the Museum. Please phone and ask someone to check the diary if this is a concern.
- There are chairs around the museum, and also folding "walking" chairs.
- Carpet is thin pile.
- Lighting is natural in the Main Gallery, with fluorescent lights and some ceiling spot lights, and is good and even, except in areas where reduced lighting is required for conservation of the exhibits.
- Museum Hall – in the adjacent Museum Hall, where lectures and some events are held, there is a sound amplification system. At present, the WC is not wheel chair accessible. The WC in the Museum's Main Gallery is available during any public event or lecture organised by the Museum.

#### Public Toilets

- There is one public and accessible WC in the Main Gallery.
- Doors to the WC are light, and opening is 870mm, 34.25".
- Clear space for a wheelchair is on the right hand side when facing the WC: 870mm, 34.25".
- Height of WC, floor to seat: 470mm, 18.5"
- There are horizontal and vertical grab rails on either side of the WC.

- The fire alarm does not include a flashing light but gallery assistants are aware of the need to check such areas in the event of an emergency. There is no red alarm cord.
- Lighting is fluorescent.
- The floor is lino.
- The taps are conventional knob style.
- There is a “baby changing” box in the locked cupboard in the WC. Please ask staff for access.

## Shop

- The shop is in the reception area and sells Museum publications and local crafts, cards and books.
- Door opening is as described for access to the Museum.
- The layout is somewhat cramped because of the unchangeable structure of the space, but this is rarely a problem.
- There is a counter but it is not a barrier to communication with the gallery assistant.
- The display racks are at different heights and the gallery assistant is there to help.
- There is no background music.
- There is a hearing loop system.

## Additional Information

- All staff are given basic disability awareness training at induction.
- Staff are trained in emergency procedures at induction and an annual update includes a practice fire drill. There is emergency lighting throughout.
- Trained assistance dogs are welcome. A water bowl could be produced if requested.
- In general the signage is black on white, Calibri and a minimum of 14pt. Fire exits are signed white on green.
- A mobility scooter could be charged on request if the scooter user has their mains charger. Otherwise, Shopmobility might be able to help.
- Tourist information – we can give basic tourist information from our local knowledge, particularly about history and heritage and other local attractions. The main source for accommodation information
