The Incorporated Trades of Elgin, 1234 – 2014

1. The Royal Charter

Facsimile of the charter granted by Alexander II to the Guildry of Elgin in 1268, confirmed 22nd October 1396 by Thomas Dunbar, Earl of Moray*

(*Recent research suggests that the date 1234 is incorrect and added later; the witness Reginald Le Chen was the king's chamberlain from 1267-1269, in the reign of Alexander III. The 20th year of his reign was 1268 and so this charter dates from that year.)

2. Seal matrix

Design: drum and drumsticks (crossed) inscribed: "Sigillium Commune de Nova Elgina" meaning: "This is the sigil/symbol of the Community of New Elgin"

3. Squarewrights' Minutes Book

Minutes of the Squarewrights from 28th September 1763 until 17th April 1818. Also includes a list of deacons from 1656 and a list of freemen 1715-1818.

4. Deacon's Chain of Office

Worn by Willilam Lyon, of the Hammermen's Incorporation circa 1978.

5. Photograph of Lachlan Mackintosh

Lachlan Mackintosh was Trades convener from 1882 until 1888. He was very active in promoting the Trades after a period of inactivity. He designed the banner and the seal, both of which are on display here, and wrote a history of the Trades.

This shows the Elgin town drum with inscription "Sigillium Commune de Nova Elgina" meaning: "This is the sigil/symbol of the community of New Elgin"

8. Extract from the Magna Charta

This amendment is dated 1705 and grants representation on the Town Council to the Deacon Convener of the Trades together with two other representatives (the original document dates from 1657).

10. Photograph of the Riding of the Marches, 1932

Taken at the Wards, by the White Gates showing Convener Robert W. Forteath and ex-Convener George Clark on horseback. On foot: W. E. Watson, E. D. Jamieson, James Mackintosh and, holding horse, possibly George Forteath. This took place approximately every 2 years at the inauguration of the new Deacon Convener and involved riding or walking the boundaries of the Trades Muir in what is now New Elgin.

17. Incorporated Trades Convenery Box

This contained the minutes books and other papers of the Convenery. It was repaired by Mr Alexander Forteath, Deacon of the Glovers; then restored and treated by Mrs C. A. Young. This box originally had four locks, but two have been removed. See also the Weavers' box downstairs, dated 1658, one year after the Magna Charta of the Trades was signed (*in the People and Place 'The Burgh' display case*).
